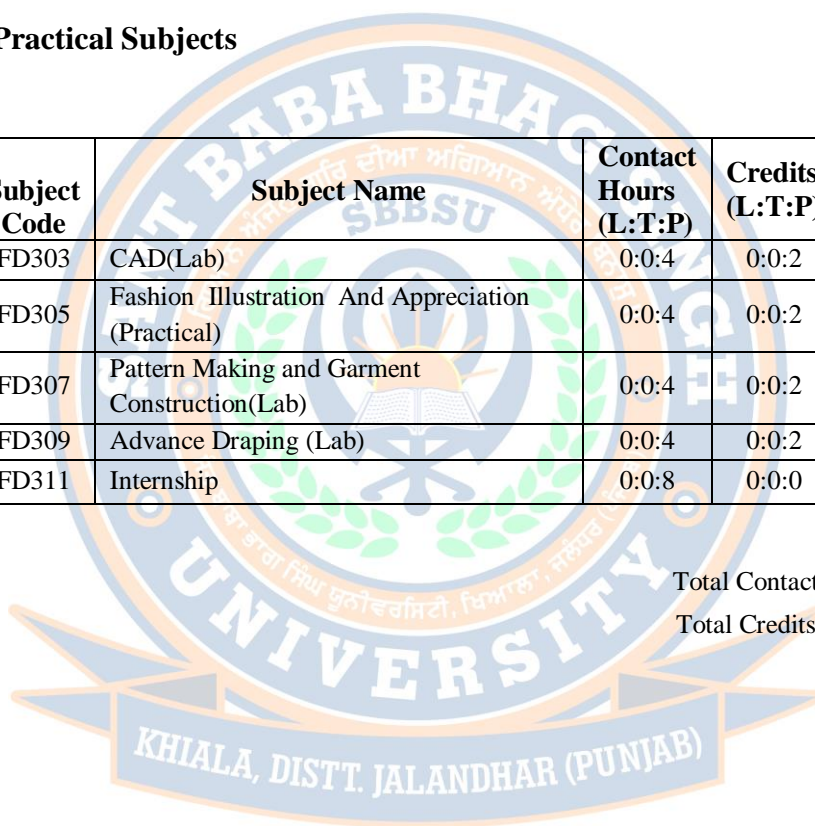

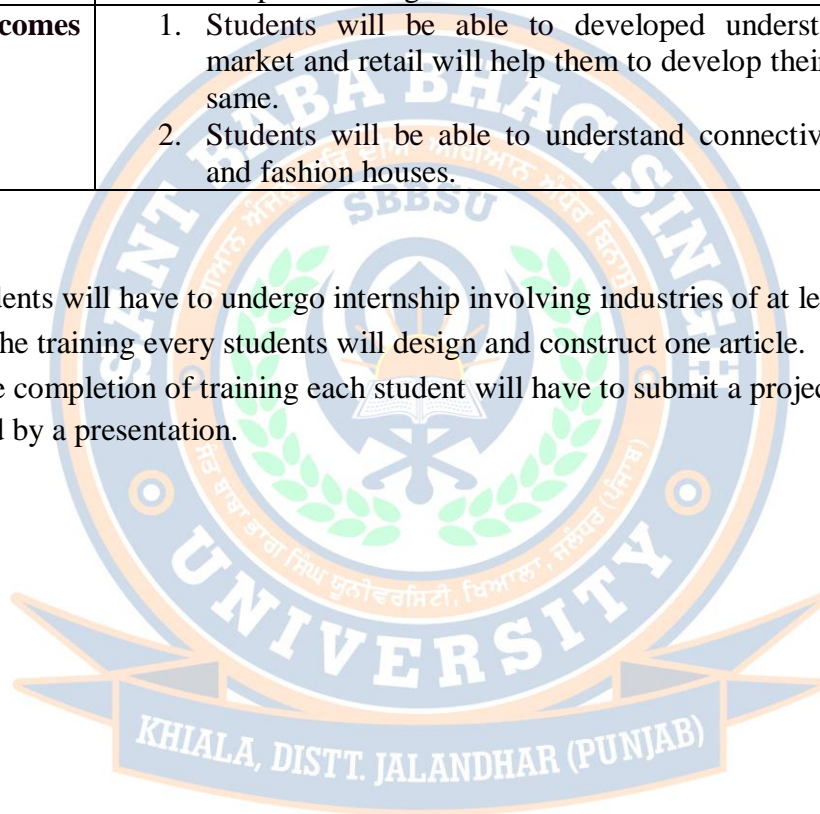

6. The Portfolio Must Include: Page of contents, each separate project should include inspiration sheet/story board and color chart with appropriate swatches.
7. Client profile and indication of the market /country.
8. Give a name/theme to each project.
9. Flat working drawings, detailed magnification and specification sheets showing your technical strength are vitally important.
10. Line planning, fabric indications, fabric consumption, detailed measurement charts etc are all essential. These are to be used in conjunction with croquis.
11. Design development sheets/design journal to show the creative process and /or commercial feasibility. Stylized illustration may be included as a separate segment.
12. There should be inclusion of designs for men, women and children.
13. At least one collection should have touch of the Indian ethos. This is to be based on innovative fabric combinations, surface texture and ornamentation. It is very important that the designs and embroidery motifs be original.

***UNIFORM FORMAT:** It is important to keep all the sheets of the same size to maintain visual continually.

Sheets should be grouped separately and systematically either horizontally or vertically. This ensures uniformity of presentation.

The presentation of the portfolio depends on the contents and also on your layouts. (Too Much of fragmentation of a single sheet can be distractin.
